VOLUNTEER WORKERS TO

WEATHER TO SUB-FFRD BACK CFNTF RPOPULAC

"Residents must expect freezing temporatures of 10 degrees and less," warned Vera Hayes of the Social Welfare department, when asked for advice about weather conditions and the type of clothing needed in winter.

Flannel-lined coats of the heavier type are recommended, especially for womon. Overshoos and galoshes aro an absolute necessity and, long underwear, a rarity in California, is recommended.

Heavy snowfalls begin about Christmastime and cold weather will continue till carly spring. The ayorago snowfall is one to two foot. docp. The custom hore is to wear winter woollios until Easter.

Parents are advised to dress children in long woolen trousers, which can be

tiod at the ankles to keep the heat in, and car muffs. mittens, and caps must not be everlooked.

"The stoves in your apartments will give plenty. of heat during the winter!" Miss Hayes concluded.

Art Tarman, general manager of the Lamer Daily News, who visited the Projcot: last :wook, said, "Tho coldest day last winter was 24 degrees below zero," and warned that every little hole should be plugged because during blizzards snow will penetrate any places that air can come through.

He also suggested that some kind of oovering be provided for the brick floors to prevent . rostbitten feet.

"This is a country of freak weather and anything can happen here," the Lamar newspaporman said.
