VOLUNTEER WORKERS TO HAUL COAL

Volunteer workers to haul coal into the Center are needed immediately to alleviate the severe shortage caused by sudden cold weather, Project Director James Lindley said today.

There is sufficient coal at the railroad tracks in Granada to provide an estimated 55 tons per day during the entire cold spell, according to Henry F. Halliday, administrative officer, and at least 40 haulers and 10 truck drivers are needed to bring it into the Center.

Volunteers are asked to apply at the office of Walter Knodel, placement officer, 6F-6B, immediately.

SHORT CIRCUIT BLAMED FOR FIRE

A short circuit caused by an over-loaded power line was the reason for the fire that broke out between the roof and ceiling of the 9B mess hall on Monday morning.

The Center fire department was on the job in double quick time and had the flames under control before any serious damage resulted.

SUB-ZERO WEATHER TO FACE CENTER POPULACE

"Residents must expect freezing temperatures of 10 degrees and less," warned Vera Hayes, of the Social Welfare department, when asked for advice about weather conditions and the type of clothing needed in winter.

Flannel-lined coats of the heavier type are recommended, especially for women. Overshoes and galoshes are an absolute necessity and long underwear, a rarity in California, is recommended.

Heavy snowfalls begin about Christmastime and cold weather will continue till early spring. The average snowfall is one to two feet deep. The custom here is to wear winter woolies until Easter.

Parents are advised to dress children in long woolen trousers, which can be

tied at the ankles to keep the heat in, and ear muffs, mittens, and caps must not be overlooked.

"The stoves in your apartments will give plenty of heat during the winter," Miss Hayes concluded.

Art Tarman, general manager of the Lamar Daily News, who visited the Project last week, said, "The coldest day last winter was 24 degrees below zero," and warned that every little hole should be plugged because during blizzards snow will penetrate any places that air can come through. He also suggested that some kind of covering be provided for the brick floors to prevent frost-bitten feet.

"This is a country of freak weather and anything can happen here," the Lamar newspaperman said.

Plans for a cooperative store, selling school supplies and candy, are nearly completed, Dr. Enoch Dumas revealed today. It will be owned, operated, and patronized exclusively by elementary school students.

Students pay twenty-five cents for membership, which entitles them to reduced rates when purchasing at the store, it was stated by Dumas.

In order to avoid confusion an outline of procedure necessary for receipt of packages was made by McGance. Block managers will inform each family heads of the date and time to apply at the distribution station. The clothes will be separately wrapped conforming to the evacuees' previous order and will be numbered to facilitate handling. Signature of the consignees will be necessary. However in absence of such persons an adult member of the family or a nearest adult relative will suffice.

Clothes of those who have left this Center for the outside will be returned to Santa Anita where the finance director will decide as to the method of forwarding to the new addresses.
